



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We are living in an historic moment. We are each called to take part in a great transformation. Our survival as a species is threatened by global warming, economic meltdown, and an ever-increasing gap between rich and poor. Yet these threats offer an opportunity to awaken as an interconnected and beloved community.

Here in South Africa, interconnectedness is described by the concept *ubuntu*. Ubuntu is the philosophy and belief that our humanity is inextricably bound up in one another, and any tear in the fabric of connection must be repaired for us all to be made whole. This interconnectedness is the very root of who we are. Thus, compassion and service to others enhances the humanity of all, including oneself. As South Africa overcame the trauma of Apartheid, we discovered that ubuntu builds extraordinary resilience, enabling our people to survive and emerge still human despite all efforts to dehumanize our community.

Ubuntu tells us that we can create a more peaceful world by striving for goodness in each moment, wherever we are. Thus we are invited to become life artists, those who create lives of wholeness and beauty at every instant. Out of the cacophony of random suffering and chaos that can mark human life, the life artist sees or creates a symphony of meaning and order. A life of wholeness does not depend on what we experience, but on how we experience our lives.

My conviction that this is true is borne out not only by my experiences in South Africa, where we miraculously averted a bloodbath by cultivating forgiveness over cycles of retribution and violence, but also by many visits to other countries suffering oppression and conflict. We can indeed transform the world, and we are each called to take part in this sacred work.

Random Kindness and Senseless Acts of Beauty offers this simple and powerful message of wisdom and hope.

Wherever we are, we can create beauty. Moment by moment, we can create joy. Instant by instant, we can offer kindness.




































Anne Herbert (1959–2015) was an American writer known for authoring the popular expression, "Practice random kindness and senseless acts of beauty," a delightful precept that has appeared on garden gates, bumper stickers, and posters, and has inspired books and celebrations worldwide.



Margaret Paloma Pavel, PhD, is an educator, psychologist, and international advocate of healthy, just, and resilient urban communities. She is founder and president of Earth House Center of Oakland, California, and editor of the book *Breakthrough Communities: Sustainability and Justice in the Next American Metropolis*. Dr. Pavel holds a Master of Divinity from Harvard University.

Mayumi Oda is a global antinuclear activist and revered artist known as the "Matisse of Japan." She has illustrated her own books and the books of the esteemed Buddhist monk Thich Nhat Hanh. She has exhibited over fifty one-woman shows, and her art is in permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art, New York, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Deeply caring about Mother Earth, she is the founder of Ginger Hill Farm in Hawai'i.



Desmond Mpilo Tutu is Archbishop Emeritus of Cape Town South Africa and world renowned social rights activist. He is recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, the Albert Schweitzer Prize for Humanitarianism, the Pacem in Terris Award, the Sydney Peace Prize, and the Gandhi Peace Prize.

It is my great joy to know this twentieth-anniversary edition of *Random Kindness and Senseless Acts of Beauty* will support community resilience throughout the world. The first edition of this book was published to break the spell of war, random violence and senseless acts of cruelty. When Anne Herbert and Margaret Paloma Pavel approached me to illustrate this beautiful story, I had been working as an antinuclear activist in Japan and the United States. I felt strongly drawn to this message and poured my emotions onto the images, creating a pictorial complement that drew from my experiences with our world and my work as an activist. I based my design on the 12th Century Japanese scroll—*Birds and Animals Frolicking*.

My original art for the book was painted in black and red. In early 2011, I felt compelled to turn my illustrations into color, breathing new life into the story. I was deeply immersed in this venture when the tragic earthquake and tsunami struck on March 11, 2011. I was in Nara, Japan, at that time working with traditional scroll-maker Mr. Shosaku Yoshimura. It was there I knew this timely story had to be told, once again, to the new generations that will care for this planet.
